

## Center to Celebrate 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary With Events

The Pacific Center turned 30 years old last month and will be celebrating this milestone with special events throughout 2003 and the first half of 2004.

Already in the works are:

- A special booth at this month's Pride Festival in San Francisco
- A "Homecoming" Block Party later this summer in Berkeley
- An LGBT dinner dance in the Fall, and
- A 30-minute special featuring the Pacific Center on GAY TV

"This is really a special time for all of us who have ever been involved with the Pacific Center," said Michelle Dixon, PC Board member and Chair of the 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Committee. "We're the third oldest LGBT center in the country, and have played important roles in the lives of thousands of community members."

In May, major donors, funders and supporters celebrated at an anniversary reception sponsored by the Pacific Center board. Joining this group were Berkeley Mayor Tom Bates, Berkeley Councilmember Kriss Worthington and Oakland Councilmember Danny Wan.

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## March Appeal Yields Over \$17,000 in Support! 'angels on our shoulders'

As the result of a special mailing and an appeal made in the March issue of *Pacific Currents*, \$17,800 has been contributed to the Pacific Center to help soften the blow from decreases in foundation grants and government funding in the last year.

"I am overwhelmed by the support we received in such a short period of time," said Frank Gurucharri, Executive Director. "We certainly have angels on our shoulders here at the Center."

The contributions came from fewer than 10 donors, reports Scott Vachon, the Pacific Center Board's Fundraising Committee Chair.

"We can't say thank you enough to everyone who was able to help," said Vachon. "This was an extraordinary appeal above and beyond our usual Fall mailing, and the response has been extraordinary, too."

Nearly 75% of the amount raised came from just four donors. One gift of \$2,500 was specifically designated to support the Center's youth program.

Last year, the Pacific Center operated in the black. These funds will help to keep the Center's services as much at capacity as possible during the coming quarter.

## VOICES lead the way...

VOICES is a leadership program for the young people of the Pacific Center. Right now there are six members: Andy Duran, Derron Johnson, Junior Bo, Phoebe Hasley, Rachel Sternin-Moser, and Rachel Stevens – and honorary member, KeeKee Jenkins. They meet every Wednesday from 5 – 6:30 p.m. and discuss various aspects of the youth programs, groups, and other Pacific Center business. There are two workshops organized each month by the members themselves, and they all sit on three different committees: Outreach, Special Events and Workshops.

If you're ever in the Center, you've probably seen them around. They are the reason the youth space (La Luna) is open the hours that it is, as the youth coordinator Mateo Cruz is pretty busy and can't be there all the time.



Besides welcoming new youth into the space, the VOICES members also do outreach for the youth groups, update the website, do speaking engagements as part of the Youth Speaker's Bureau, as well as plan events like the barbeque for the graduating seniors or spoken word/talent events. As a result of their efforts, every youth is accounted for that participates in the drop-in space or other programs. Gossip and drama are not tolerated, and cliques don't really exist. Anything that comes up is dealt with right away – people are holding each other accountable for what they say and do.

Does that sound like a typical youth program to you? Lately, they have also worked with Frank Gurucharri and Mateo Cruz to prepare proposals for grant funding possibilities. Previously, members received a stipend to help cover the cost of participating in meetings and activities. Now, this is not the case.

## Planning for Our Future

The Pacific Center has three major projects on its plate right now to better prepare the Center for the future. They are (1) Planning for a new facility, (2) Strategic Planning to ensure we will have the right programs for our community in the new facility, and (3) building our fundraising efforts to be more professional and successful.

The new facility project involves working with a developer to build a Berkeley-based LGBT community cultural complex with the Pacific Center as an anchor tenant. This would allow a cluster of other organizations and businesses that serve our community

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to be part of this complex as well. One possibility is to also include some affordable housing units on the upper floors available for, let's say, LGBT folks. We are currently working on the selection of the developer to work with us and we are working with the City of Berkeley on the selection of the future site for the complex. Funding for this multi-million dollar project is also being planned. This project is expected to take three to five years before the building is complete and we are moved in.

A second option could be to secure the building next to the current home of the Pacific Center and tie the two buildings together into a new facility. This would involve retrofitting and renovations to accommodate the Center's needs. It would mean that the Center would remain by itself and not be a part of a larger LGBT community cultural complex.

It is important that we begin planning now so the Pacific Center can manage its growth over the next three to five years and prepare to occupy its new facility.

This planning project has two parts: (1) a large diversity initiative and (2) a strategic plan. Both of these should be completed by June of 2004. The diversity initiative will assess what the Pacific Center needs to do to become truly culturally inclusive and to identify the strategies and resources needed to reach that goal. We need to ensure every individual feels equally welcome and safe at the Center and includes people of all ages, races, ethnic backgrounds, people with disabili-

She is proud to be a Filipino woman who has recently acknowledged her female-to-male, (FTM), transgender identity. She is at the beginning of exploring what this actually means for her and does not yet know where it will lead.

The best part of working as billing clerk and clinic office manager for the past two years is the personal contact with the Pacific Center’s interns. She enjoys watching them grow during their internship. She is challenged, however, to communicate effectively with the school bureaucracies which are necessary in recruiting and managing intern placements.

The recruitment of interns is a detail-oriented process. It includes requesting and submitting a variety of materials and building relations with schools. In addition, Perlita handles all the details of Medi-Cal, day-to-day clinic operations, therapy rooms, and phone shifts.

ties, folks with different gender identities all along the gender spectrum, sexual orientation (especially bisexuals), health status and any other differences by which we humans identify. We will be asking folks who already use the center and others in the community for their input into this assessment.

For the strategic planning we will again be asking the community what it needs from the Center in terms of services, programs and activities. This will help us update our Mission and to properly target all the communities and groups we should be serving. It will also help us determine the best services and programs we should offer for those we serve. The Plan will also iden-

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tify the costs and funding needed to have these programs. For example, many of our current core services are directed to helping people come out and to providing emotional support for those in need. We may find that we should offer adoption workshops and assistance for those planning a new family. Maybe more services for seniors are needed. Maybe more social activities. Our survey and assessment information will give us this information.

For the facility planning, and the diversity and program assessments we plan to survey several groups in addition to posting the survey on our web site in July. (If you are interested in participating in this survey, I encourage you to email me at frank@pacificcenter.org to let me know. We would love to hear from you.)

We are grateful to the City of Berkeley and the Evelyn and Walter Haas Jr. Fund for providing the funding for both the new facility and strategic planning efforts.

The third major project is fundraising. It makes no sense to assess the needs of the community, determine the size and nature of the Center's core services and plan a new facility without also beginning a serious fundraising program. The Center has received money from the San Francisco Foundation to engage the services of professional fundraisers. Our fundraising will target three distinct areas: (1) grants from public funds
